One Bright Spot in the 2007 Energy Bill

The energy bill, signed by President Bush on December 19, 2007, requires that by 2014, all light bulbs must use 25% to 30% less energy than they do today. Traditional incandescent light bulbs use almost 90% of the energy they consume to produce heat, not light. The phase-in will start with 100-watt bulbs in 2012 and end with 40-watt bulbs in 2014. By 2020, all bulbs must be 70% more efficient. Compact fluorescent bulbs already meet that efficiency standard and last at least 5 to 10 times longer than incandescent bulbs. Consumers will soon see other technologies competing for their business as halogen bulbs and LEDs (light emitting diodes) hit the market.

Bulb Recycling

Compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) contain a small amount of mercury. To gain the greatest environmental advantage from CFLs, they should be disposed of in a way that properly captures and recycles their mercury.

Tideland EMC has established CFL recycling stations at all 4 district offices. Bring in your used CFLs and we'll make sure they are sent to an authorized recycling center.

Celebrate Arbor Day on April 25 by planting the right tree in the right place.

- Consult your nursery salesperson to determine the mature height and width of trees before purchasing
- The following trees are power line friendly when planted outside the utility right-of-way:

Crepe Myrtle
Dogwood
Eastern Redbud
Japanese Maple
Purpleleaf Plum
Star Magnolia
Yaupon

- Measure 15 feet away from power lines and then half the distance of the width of the tree's spread when fully grown; this is as close as you should ever plant to power lines
